January

January 2, 2010 Florida endured its 10th coldest January of record.

Gainesville started its record of 13 days consecutively of freezing temperatures (the old record was nine) set December of 1960. Tallahassee had 14 consecutive days; the old record was set January 27 to February 8 of 1966.

January 5, 1892 An F3 tornado killed 3, hurt 20 on its rampage from WSW of Fayetteville, Georgia to near McDonough. It was noted by some that its roar could be heard for miles.

January 6, 2011 Absolutely astonishing! The low temperature in Canada's Coral Harbor stayed above the long-term normal high from the 2nd to the 12th. Two days 25° low was 54° above the normal. A similar anomaly would mean today's low in central Park in New York City would have been 80 °F.

January 9, 2010 Probably not what visitors or residents wanted to see. Some sleet and occasionally mixed with a few wet snowflakes fell over parts of central Florida from Tampa to Palm Bay and points north in the A.M. Some minor accumulations were seen on vehicles and pool screens.

January 11, 2002 The Russian research site Vostok Station, at an elevation of 11,444 feet on the Antarctic ice sheet claims the world all-time record low temperature of -129° recorded on July 21, 1983. Today's high of 10 °F at this station was an all-time record high temperature.

January 18, 1999

A microburst in a thunderstorm gave winds to 86 mph that imploded a greenhouse in Bridgehampton New York. Fortunately there were no injuries.

January 20, 2008

You know it's cold when you have to deal with frozen beer during a tailgate party. The temperature at the start of the NFL championship at Green Bay, Wisconsin (Lambeau Field) was -1° and a wind chill of -23, despite the cold the New York Giants beat the Packers 23 to 20.

January 31, 1957 (26th - 31st)

A freight train was trapped by near record snow in Colorado's Cumbres Pass. Subsequent work and rescue trains were trapped by avalanches approximately 60 crew were involved. Heavy snows, high winds, ground blizzards hurt rescue efforts by Army snow weasels and helicopters.
